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Correct School Uniform and out of uniform procedures

Junior Boys:

Summer: Green/white polo shirt with school emblem. Black shorts. Winter: Solid black jacket with **NO** writing/patterns/logos. Plain black trousers.

Senior Boys:

Summer: Green/white senior polo shirt with school emblem. Black shorts. Winter: Senior school jersey or solid black jacket with **NO** writing/patterns/logos. Plain black trousers.

Junior Girls:

Summer: Green/white polo shirt with school emblem. School tartan skirt. Black shorts (the same length as school sport shorts).

Winter: Solid black jacket with **NO** wrtiting/patterns/logos. School skirt (with black tights underneath). Black trousers.

Senior Girls:

Summer: Green/white senior polo shirt or white blouse. School bottle green skirt. Black shorts.

Winter: Senior school jersey or solid black jacket with **NO** writing/patterns/logos. School bottle green skirt (with black tights underneath). Plain black trousers.

Boys and Girls Sport/PE Uniform:

Maclean High School sport polo shirt, black shorts or plain black tracksuit pants.

Procedures for Out of School Uniform

Students are expected to be in school uniform at all times, if they are not in uniform they need to bring a note from home and hand it to the PC Teacher in the morning.

Students will be marked as 'out of uniform' if a note from home is not supplied, and a letter will be sent home to parents if a student repeatedly does not follow the correct procedure.

Heron Island Excursion 2019-2020

The 2019 University of Queensland's Heron Island Excursion has been postponed due to COVID19 restrictions and continued NSW-Queensland border closures. The Year 10 student cohort will not attend Heron Island this November but are being offered the opportunity to attend next year for 4 nights from **Monday 1st March - Friday 5th March** (Week 6 Term 1) whilst they are in Year 11. This excursion has been historically offered to Year 11 students and so we are reverting back to this formula.

If you have any interest in attending this excursion or questions about your eligibility, you **must** attend the **information meeting** that will be held at the **start of lunch on Tuesday, 2nd February** (Term 1 Week 2).



Attendance at the meeting is **compulsory** if you are hoping to gain a place on this excursion. [If you cannot attend this meeting you must see Mr Ford or Mrs Hollis in the Science staff room with a note from your parents stating the reason]. A list of 36 successful applicants and a reserve list will be placed on the Science notice board on the Monday of the next week. From this time you will be required to pay your \$100 deposit and attend a compulsory preparatory day which will include CPR training and snorkelling proficiency swim (date to be advised). The total of the \$900 cost must be paid prior to the excursion so it is advisable that families begin saving well in advance.

School Bus Travel for 2021

2021 school travel applications are now open

Applications for student travel in 2021 opened from Monday 12th October 2020. Students who require a school travel pass for 2021 can now <u>apply</u> online. A new application should be submitted if a student is applying for a school travel pass for the first time or requesting an additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (eg joint custody).

Students who have changed school/campus, changed address, repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel enitlement should <u>re-apply or update their</u> <u>details</u>. Applications must be completed by the student's parent or legal guardian if the student is aged under 16 years.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition which is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

If a student needs to update their information or re-apply, they should go online to <u>https://transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/updateDetails</u>.

Applications need to be submitted before 31 December 2020 to ensure that current student entitlements are updated and their current entitlement/card remains valid. If their application is submitted after 31 December 2020, the system will atomatically cancel an entitlement/card and a new one will need to be issued. Students applying for a SSTS entitlement for the first time will receive their card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2021.

New Concession Entitlement Cards

Transport for NSW will be replacing the below card with Transport Concession Entitlement Cards (TCEC) from October 2020:

• Senior Secondary Student Concession Card (16 years and over) - also used by Mature Secondary Students (18 years and over), Distance Education Students and Home School Students.

All previous cards will be valid until they expire. Students who require a Transport Concession Entitlement Card should speak with their school administration staff.

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Parental Consent Form for Student Evaluation of EPPP Program

Parents and carers of students participating in the school's Educational Pathways Pilot Program (EPPP) are being asked to complete a parental consent form for their child to evaluate the EPPP Program. The program is a NSW Department of Education led initiative to improve career pathways and future employment outcomes for young people. Our school is taking part in the program to test new ways of providing careers advice, and support young people in obtaining job-ready life skills.

The NSW Department of Education has developed 10 pilots for the program aimed at improving career development services, vocational education and training pathways, and future employment outcomes for young people. Researchers from Western Sydney University will evaluate these new pilots for the program. This year, the researchers will examine student experiences and their perceived value of the pilots. This will inform future improvement and expansion of the program. In the final two years (2021 and 2022) of the evaluation, the researchers will focus on understanding the impact of the program on students' knowledge, skills and confidence towards career planning and career choices. A total of 24 schools across South Western Sydney and the North Coast are participating in the EPPP Program.

Your child is invited to participate in a three-year evaluation of the Educational Pathways Pilot Programs. In order to capture your child's experience and perceived value of the pilots they will complete a short 7-minute response survey for each of the programs they participate in. Your child's answers to the short response survey questions will be used to improve the quality of the pilots. In addition to the short response surveys, next year your child will be invited to complete a 30-minute online survey in May and a follow-up survey in November. These surveys ask questions about how your child makes career decisions and their experience in training programs. Your child may also be invited to participate in a 40-minute peer focus group discussion towards the end of this year with 3 other students. Your child's evaluation of their experience of the EPPP will help improve the program for future years.
