Winter:

Hats: Black cap with school emblem

Footwear: Black leather covered shoes

Senior Uniform:

Girls: Green skirt White blouse with school emblem Boys:

Black shorts School polo shirt with school emblem White cotton shirt with school emblem

Unisex Winter:

Black trousers/slacks (not jeans, track pants or tights) Jumper - bottle green V neck with school emblem Soft shell bottle green jacket with school emblem

Footwear: Black leather covered shoes

Unisex Sports Uniform:

- MHS sports shirt and black mid length shorts with MHS on the bottom left of the short
- Sports jackets bottle green wind stopper with school emblem
- The wearing of sports uniform on the day's students do PE is allowed ONLY for the duration of the PE class
- Students must bring their sports uniform with them to school and change into it for PE and then change back to their school uniform for the remainder of the day, except Wednesday when students have sport

NAPLAN Online - Information for parents and carers

As children progress through their school years, it is very important that checks are made along the way to see how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and mathematics skills that will set them upon the path to success as adults.

NAPLAN is a point-in-time assessment that allows parents to see how their child is progressing in literacy and numeracy against the national standard and compared with their peers throughout Australia. At the classroom level, NAPLAN provides additional information to support teachers' professional judgement about student progress.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Federal, State and Territory education ministers agreed that all schools will gradually transition from the current paper-based NAPLAN to NAPLAN Online in order to provide a better and more precise assessment that is more engaging for students. One of the main benefits of NAPLAN Online is tailored (or adaptive) testing, in which the test presents questions of higher or lower complexity depending on a student's performance. Tailored (or adaptive) testing is designed to assess a wider range of student abilities and to measure student achievement more precisely. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions more challenging than usual; they may be taking a more complex test pathway. A student's overall NAPLAN score is based on the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly.

Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life. Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 participate in the annual NAPLAN tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling. grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The assessment provides parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process - it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance. NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

NAPLAN Online - Information for parents and carers

What can I do to support my child?

You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is just one part of their school program, and by reminding them on the day to simply do their best.

NAPLAN Online is not a test of keyboard skills. There are variations in how fast and well a student can type - just as there are variations in how fast and well a student can write by hand. During allocated Maths and English lessons, students in Year 7 and Year 9 will have the opportunity to become familiar with the types of questions in the tests and teachers will provide appropriate support and guidance.

Participation in NAPLAN

All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 are expected to participate in the annual NAPLAN assessment. Students with a disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided for classroom assessments.

What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

NAPLAN Online Timetable

The NAPLAN Online assessment window starts on **Tuesday, 10th May and finishes on Friday, 20th May 2022.** A test schedule will be published early Term 2.

How is my child's performance reported?

Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each assessment. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student has demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level. A NAPLAN individual student report will be issued by your child's school later in the year.

How are NAPLAN test results used?

- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to better identify students who would benefit from greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas to improve in teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.

Year 7 Brooms Head Cultural Tour 2022

Uncle Ron and Aunty Glenda certainly talked to the skies to bring a fabulous sunny day for the final Cultural Tour for 2022.

Arriving at Brooms Head students and staff were mesmerised with an introductory talk by Uncle Ron. He spoke quietly about growing up on Yaegl land and learning from the Elders, Aunties and Uncles where to put fish traps, how to collect pippies, beach worms and other bush tucker. He also spoke of different Aboriginals coming to Yaegl land to trade animal skins for stone tools and beach worms.

After morning tea on the headland looking towards Sandon, the Year 7 and Year 11 Aboriginal Studies students were then divided into 4 groups and rotated through different activities. Mrs Simpson led the line drawing activity of the coastline. Ms Hamilton combined an orienteering lesson and local flora identification. Uncle Ron had students intrigued with a collection of Aboriginal Artifacts. He explained how slurry helped sharpen stones. He then went into great detail how the sinew from the kangaroo tail was chewed until it was softened and then wrapped around the stone. As it dried out the sinew became tighter on the stone and made the perfect axe head. The final group with Aunty Glenda sat quietly on the hillside looking toward Sandon. With a fabulous clear sky and light winds, she spotted stingrays in the clear water. She spoke of the need for cultural responsibility to look after our land. She encouraged all to walk the coastline with family and friends to experience a sense of belonging. Aunty Glenda reminisced of learning to read the tides and find beach worms and bush tucker. When the willy wagtail dances around, she knows a message will come. When the magpies sing so loudly in the morning a sunny day will unfold. When the tea tree bloom, bream will come in from the ocean to the river. As the flannel flowers bloom shellfish and pippies will be found on the beaches. But always remembering the importance of the balance of nature and food.

A special thaks to Deb, Anj, Krystal and Sam for helping organise the damper and cold drinks. Also, a huge well done to Ms Hamilton who has coordinated another epic Year 7 Cultural Tour leading into the River of Learning Term Two. Mrs Sutton.

Family/Teacher Interviews

Family/Teacher Interviews are an important tool for building partnerships between school and home. We would like to give you advanced notice for our Family/Teacher Interviews which will be conducted on Thursday, 5th May. Bookings are now open through the portal. In making these bookings more efficient please consider that you will find downstairs in the Library: Science, English, TAS, Learning Support and Career teachers. In classrooms upstairs above the Library you will find: Maths, Humanities, Language, PDHPE and CAPA teachers. You may be able to coordinate your bookings to limit the number of stair runs! If you have any problems making your bookings you can contact the friendly office staff on 6645 2244 to make bookings for you.

Take a few minutes before the meeting to jot down any questions or comments you have, because interviews are only for a short time, it is good to have a reminder of the points you want to raise.

Common questions may include: How is my child fitting in with other children? What are the students working on now? Is there anything about my child's needs that I should know? Does my child ask questions, participate in class discussions and other activities? Is my child's progress satisfactory? What activities does my child seem to enjoy the most at school? What kinds of things will the class be covering this term? How is my child progressing in comparison to others in the year? Is there anything I can be doing to help my child at home? Do you have any concerns about my child? Can you tell me the best time and way to contact you if I have a query or concern?

Also, list anything that might be happening at home that may be helpful for your child's teacher to know. If your child has seen a specialist for example, there may be some information that is important for the teacher or the school counsellor to know Mrs Emma Turner.

LS1 Learning About Water


The students in LS1 have been learning about water this term. They demonstrated their knowledge of various bodies of water by making these dioramas.
