The last few days at EKKA were very special for the Cattle Team, with two unexpected highlights. On Friday, Day 7, our Braford cow Mystique and Allure her calf, were awarded first in their class. They then went on to win the championship in that class and were awarded Champion Female. The cow and calf were then judged against a bull of the same breed and were awarded second place for the Supreme Champion Braford Cow. (The history of judging dictates that it is very rare for a cow to win over a bull in this type of event) Mystique's win as Supreme Braford Cow made her eligible for the Grand Parade on Day 8, along with all the other champions. We were thrilled with this result as the Braford cow and calf have been owned and raised by Maclean High School. It was an incredible feat, given that there were 720 cattle and 22 breeds at the EKKA this year.

Our second highlight came on Day 8 at the RNA Premier Beef Presentation Awards. These awards are given to beef owners' carcasses processed during EKKA. In this competition, a carcass is assessed on criteria such as weight, fat depth, meat yield, and meat colour. Maclean High School was awarded second place for Led Steer Carcass 376-400 kg, scoring 87 points out of 100.

Such success cannot come without a dedicated team who are constantly working behind the scenes. Thank you to Pete who was with the students every step of the way. If they were up at 5am he was up at 4am preparing the stalls, carting equipment and making sure things ran smoothly. Mark, Scott, Tracy and Dean, our parent helpers, a big thank you for everything, which included driving cattle trucks, preparing meals, shopping, steam ironing shirts and jeans and moving gear between rings. A big thank you to Leigh, the unofficial manager and logistics expert whose extensive knowledge, organisational skills and eye for detail, including stain removal from show jeans (white), kept the whole operation moving forward each day of the competition. Their dedication and hard work were truly inspiring and played a significant role in our success.

Lastly, congratulations to the team: Abi, Indi, Tully, Riley, Elora, Maya, Lara, Neve, Tara, Nathan, Bailey, Bryson, Olivia, and Grace. These students and their teacher, Mr. Kirkland, have worked incredibly hard inside and outside the ring to showcase excellence in teaching and learning within the Cattle Program at Maclean High School. Getting a Head Start

Recently, we teamed up with the Educational Pathways Program to offer students a new training opportunity designed to boost their education and career prospects.

Through the 'Head Start' initiative, students got to participate in pre-apprenticeship training with Yalagan Group Training Organisation, focusing on the construction industry. They picked up key skills across three different units and got a hands-on introduction to operating a scissor lift. Those who were eligible even had the chance to earn their EWPA (Yellow Card) qualification by completing the training and assessment for operating an elevating work platform.

A major focus of the training was on work health and safety, which is crucial in this field. Students also got practical experience using hand and power tools, including building a timber frame as part of their assessment. Plus, they completed CPR training to earn their certification in providing Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation.

These skills give the students a real advantage when applying for apprenticeships in the industry.

On the last day, each student received a certificate for their accomplishments and had a one-on-one career guidance session with experts from Yalagan and the EPP to help them plan their next steps.

This fantastic free excursion was funded by the Educational Pathways Program (EPP), ensuring our students are well-prepared for whatever comes next—whether that's further education, training, or diving straight into a job.

Recently four of our Year 10 students, Lennox, Riley, Oliver & Hayden were involved in the Engineer IT program run in collaboration with Regional Industry Education Partnerships (RIEP) & the Educational Pathways Program (EPP). Over the course of four days, they dived into welding, work prep, and a local engineering business tour in the Clarence Valley.

For the first two days, students learned different welding techniques and practiced making various projects with the help of instructors from Major Training. On the work prep day, ETC trainers covered the basics of what employers expect, how to write a resume, nail interviews, and find local job opportunities. They also had a session with a Training Services NSW advisor who talked about apprenticeships and traineeships in engineering. The group then visited Harwood Marine, Sunshine Sugar, and Wicks & Parker to see real-world engineering in action. They met with employers and apprentices, got a feel for the industry, and found out about local work experience opportunities.

This program, funded and developed by the Regional Industry Education Partnerships (RIEP) and our school's Educational Pathways Program (EPP), aimed to get students ready for higher education, training, or work. If you know someone interested in participating in programs like these, remind them to regularly check their emails and Sentral. It's also crucial for students to attend class, as we frequently have guest speakers who present and share information about these opportunities.

Bushfire danger period information for parents and carers



Factsheet

This factsheet provides information for parents and carers about arrangements for the bushfire danger period.

The NSW Department of Education has engaged external experts to conduct assessments of all NSW government schools, to identify schools at greater risk of impact from bushfires.

To support the health, safety and wellbeing of students and staff, the department, in consultation with NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS), will direct the school to temporarily cease operations on days when a Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating has been declared for your school's NSW fire area. Alternative learning arrangements will be put in place for these days.

Schools may be directed by the department to become non-operational at any time based on advice from emergency services and the State Emergency Operations Centre.



Fire Danger Ratings describe the potential level of danger should a fire start. The ratings are determined by a combination of factors including air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought.

When will I know if my child's school has been made non-operational?

At approximately 4:00pm each day the Fire Danger Rating is issued for the following day. This means that schools, including onsite preschools, will be notified after school hours that it will be non-operational the following day. Your school will notify you as soon as possible by the preferred method of communication.

Parents and carers are requested to:

- provide up-to-date home and after-hours contact details to your school
- stay up-to-date with news and local media through the bushfire danger period.




