The night involved a presentation on what it's like to be a student at UNSW that was presented by current medical students, and a general surgeon Doctor Su. - The fourth station was looking at organs and their common diseases. These organs were preserved in jars.
- The last station was blood taking. They taught us how to take blood using butterfly needles.

The cultural tours for Year 7 students and new staff were held 26th and 27th March allowing them to spend some time with the Elders who showed them some unique features of Yaegl Country.

Both groups who went out on Wednesday and Thursday all experienced typically seasonal climatic conditions, humidity and cloud cover. We were very lucky that the weather held over the two days.

The students were put into two groups and shown areas around Lake Arragan and areas around the Red Cliff Headland that were pertained to Womens' and Mens' Business respectively.

Students were then taken to the eastern end of Brooms Head beach to look at the lagoon and how it was used as a fish trap. They then went to the top of the Headland to look at the geology which was a great source for stone axes and implements. Aunty Glenda McPhail, Uncle Dale Mercy and Uncle Shane McLeay spoke to the staff and students about plants, animals and their experience in the area as children. Students were given information about the plants and their uses, animals were named in language, and the detail was given as to how the Yaegl people utilised the environment and landscape in the areas.

Morning Tea was spent on the headland looking south towards Sandon and back beach Brooms Head. The students were divided into groups to go through different activities. Aunty Glenda and Uncle Shane talked to the students in situ regarding country, history, stories, and tools, and Maclean High Staff led sessions on line drawing of the coastal landscape, geographical skills, and plant identification.

The tours are a very important part in the school calendar and are the beginning of thematic teaching that will occur in Year 7 from now and in Term 2 which is all part of the River of Learning program, and the celebration day planned for Term 2.

This year the Year 12 Aboriginal Studies class accompanied the Year 7 students and assisted with the activities which enabled them to do some field work and to listen to the information that was being given by the Elders on Country. This experience will be invaluable for the students as a major part of the Year 12 course focus is Aboriginality and the Land.

A huge thank you to Aunty Glenda McPhail, Uncle Dale Mercy, Shane McLeay, Sam Kapeen, Deborah Breckenridge, Anjanette Warburton, Kerri McLeay for their ongoing support and organisation of these tours, and all the Year 7 students who displayed exemplary behaviour over the two days.

Recently we saw a busload of students attend the Primex Field Day, one of Australia's leading primary industry expos, held in Casino. This excursion provided a unique opportunity for students to engage directly with the agricultural industry and explore a wide range of career pathways.

Students from a variety of subjects and programs attended, including our Cattle Show Team, Stage 6 Primary Industries, Hospitality, Metals & Engineering, Construction, Work Studies, and Geography. The trip allowed these students to see firsthand how their classroom learning connects to real-world industries and job opportunities.

Throughout the day, students interacted with industry professionals, explored cutting-edge technology and equipment, and learned about training, apprenticeships, and career options across the agricultural sector. There was a strong focus on practical pathways and how students can align their current studies with future job prospects.

A particularly exciting moment came when one of our Year 12 students was offered a job opportunity upon finishing school—thanks to the Certificate III in Remote Pilot course they are currently completing as part of their HSC studies. This is a fantastic example of how vocational education and training (VET) can lead directly to employment in highdemand industries.

At the end of Term One 24 students from Years 9 and 10 participated in the Science and Engineering Challenge, which is run annually by Newcastle University. The day consisted of several challenges to be solved using critical thinking skills and out-ofthe-box creativity. These tasks included building models of bridges, eco-friendly houses, windmills and gliders, fish-trap designing and code-breaking and pattern recognition challenges. It was our first year competing in this arena and we were up against teams from other schools who were old hands at the process, and who had entered much bigger teams. Despite these disadvantages our students performed exceptionally well, scoring fourth place (JUST missing out on third) which was an absolutely incredible effort!





Science & Engineering Challenge

Earlier this term we welcomed representatives from the Australian Defence Force (ADF) to our school for an engaging and informative session about the wide range of career opportunities available within the Defence Force.

A group of 30 students attended the session, where they gained valuable insights into what a career in the ADF could look like. The visit highlighted several pathways for students interested in joining the Defence Force, whether immediately after school or further down the track.

Among the key topics discussed were:

Defence University Sponsorships, which allow students to complete university studies while receiving financial and career support from the ADF.

Trade Apprenticeships, offering hands-on training and nationally recognised qualifications in a variety of trades within the Defence Force including hospitality, mechanics and electrical.

The GAP Year Program, which provides a unique opportunity for school leavers to experience life in the ADF for 12 months while earning a salary, gaining skills, and exploring different roles.

Work Experience Programs, designed to give students a real-world taste of ADF life and responsibilities in a safe and structured environment.

Students were inspired by the range of options and the structured support available through the Defence Force, whether their interests lie in leadership, technical trades, healthcare, or engineering.

Going Green in Grafton – Horticulture & Land Management Skills Taster Day

A group of students from South Grafton HS & Maclean HS undertook the Going Green in Grafton horticulture & land management skills taster day. The day had the group visit the TAFE NSW Trenayr campus and develop skills and knowledge focussing on horticulture, regenerating and land management with local industry representatives and TAFE NSW Teachers. Students spent time undertaking activities in the industry areas of conservation and ecosystem management, production horticulture and general horticulture.

The industry representatives who spoke with the students were Joao Branco from Costa Group, Jack Mooney from Provenance Propagation and Brendan (Eb) Ebner from NSW Department of Primary Industries. The representatives discussed their career journeys and the role they currently undertake. Students where guided on training, skills and qualifications required for entry into the variety of careers and workplaces.

Students undertook activities planned by TAFE NSW staff Nicole & Gary that developed an understanding around identifying weeds and land management methods, potting seedlings, planting trees and the use of tools and equipment in a safe manner.

Kate Hogan (EPP, School based apprenticeship & traineeship engagement officer) spent time with the group discussing SBAT pathways and how this HSC pathway can be an option for students interested in starting their career journey while completing their HSC or schooling.

This program was developed by the Regional Industry Education Partnerships (RIEP), Regional Workforce Development in collaboration with TAFE NSW and the Educational Pathways Program (EPP) operating at our school, to ensure students leave school well prepared for higher education, training or work.
